**SUBJECT: Input on Housing Policy**

On April 30, 2010, Governor McDonnell issued an executive order which established Virginia's first **Executive Housing Policy Framework**. This framework will guide the development of a statewide housing policy that will be announced in the Fall. This policy will address homelessness, affordable housing, workforce housing, economic development, healthy neighborhoods, effective coordination with transportation, environmental issues, and other housing-related issues.

The *Housing Policy Work Group* held its first meeting on 6/17 and is now seeking public input for addressing critical housing issues. The Work Group is looking for input at two levels: 1) the organizational/agency level and 2) the public/individual level.

**SUBJECT:** VDA Productivity Measure

VDA reports its productivity measure quarterly on Virginia Performs that can be viewed at <http://vaperforms.virginia.gov>. The productivity measure represents the network's ability to keep frail older Virginians in their home over a one year period. This measure is an attempt to show our network's success in helping seniors remain in their homes and communities and avoid or delay institutional care. Please refer to correspondence in the Tuesday Mailing from November, 18, 2008 and February 3, 2009 for more information on why this particular measure was created. VDA encourages you to monitor your agency's productivity measure. Over time, we will be able to trend this information for the state and each AAA.

The calculation begins by identifying clients in both PeerPlace and AIM that have 2 or more ADLs and received at least one in-home service such as Adult Day Care, Checking, Chore, Home Delivered Meals, Homemaker, or Personal Care during a certain quarter of the previous year divided by the same clients that received an in-home service in the same quarter one year later. The result is expressed as a percentage. The measure is holding fairly steady at 69.6% for the December 2009 – February 2010 timeframe. This means that about 70% of the clients you serve in their homes are still receiving such services from you one year later. The attached sheet shows the productivity measure for all of the AAAs except New River Valley which transitioned to PeerPlace without importing AIM data.

Last July VDA began requiring AAAs to account for closing codes when an in-home service was discontinued (see Tuesday Mailing dated June 23, 2009). The closing codes are important because they allow us to exclude individuals that should not be counted when calculating the productivity measure - such as those who have moved out of the area or perhaps are now being cared for by a relative. Knowing why they are no longer receiving AAA services will enhance our ability to analyze the true impact of our services.

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To ensure closing codes are being recorded in your agency, you can print the new quarterly Closing Codes Report for verification. Please pass this information along to the data administrator within your agency. In the future, this report will be requested during monitoring visits. In addition, VDA will soon begin publishing reports showing both productivity measures and reasons for closing cases by AAA.

We continue to look forward to working with all of you in the coming months to improve our reporting of the impact of the wonderful work you do to help older Virginians remain safe and independent in their homes and communities.
